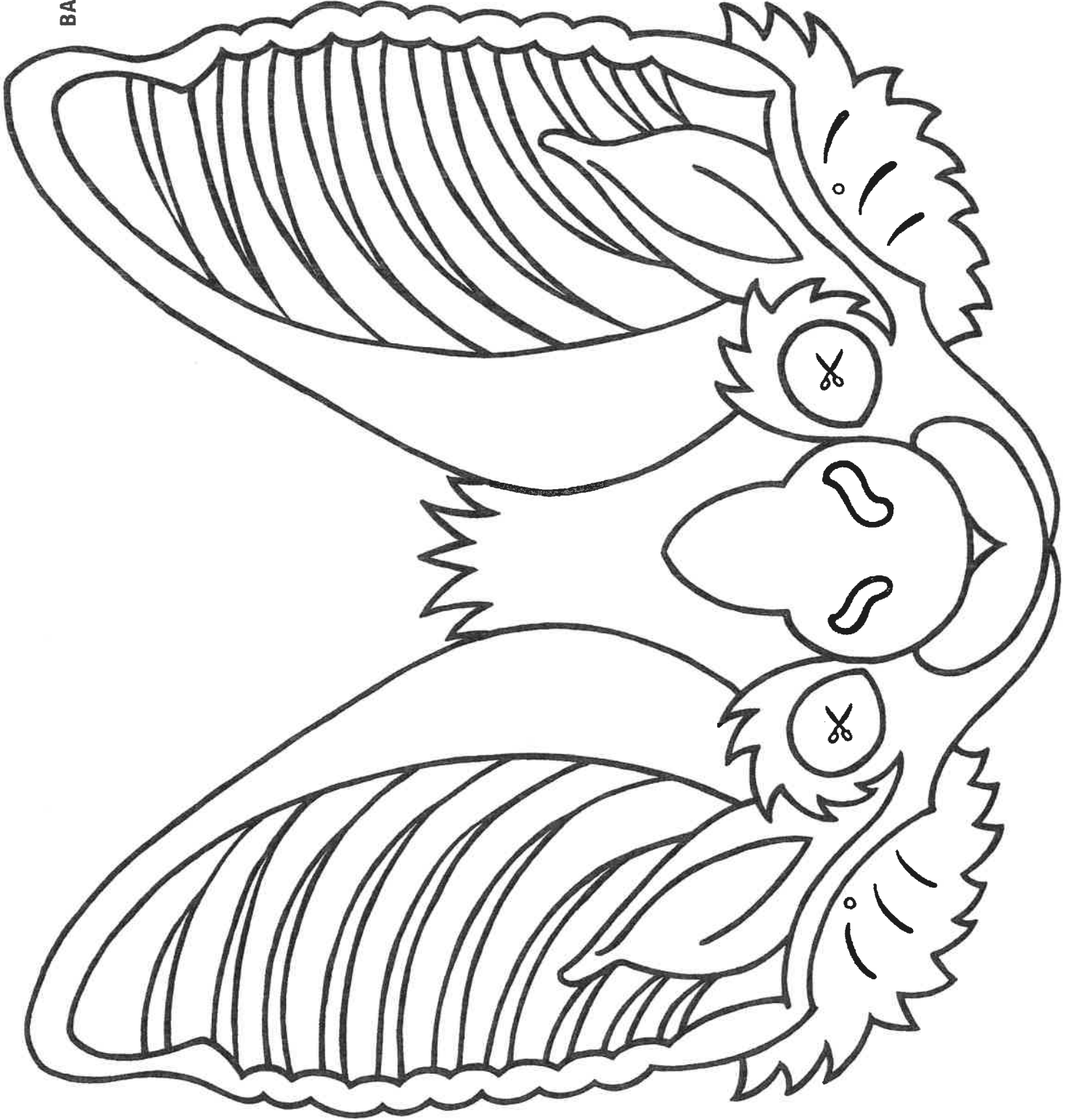

Macrotus californicus

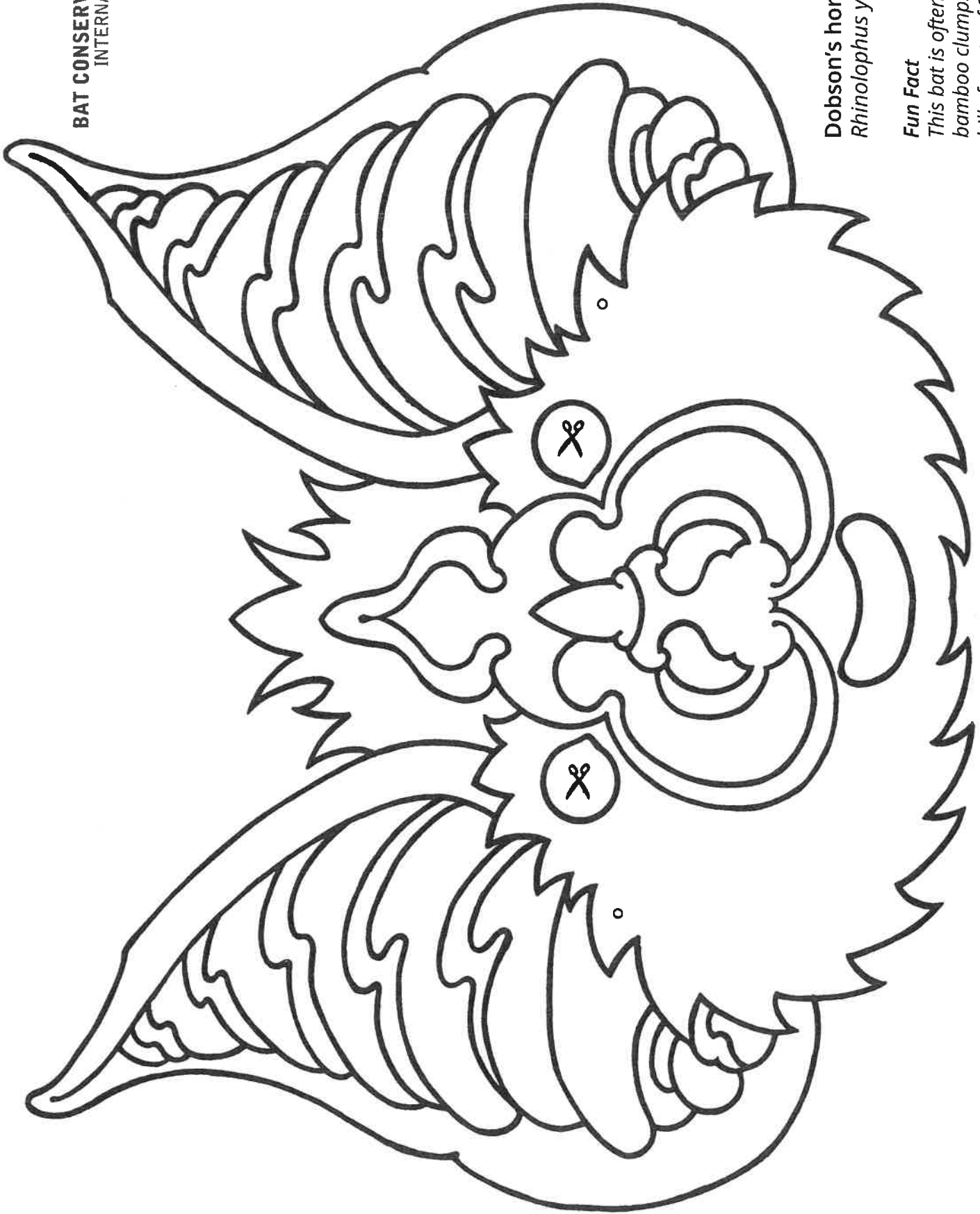
Fun Fact

Rhinolophus yunanensis

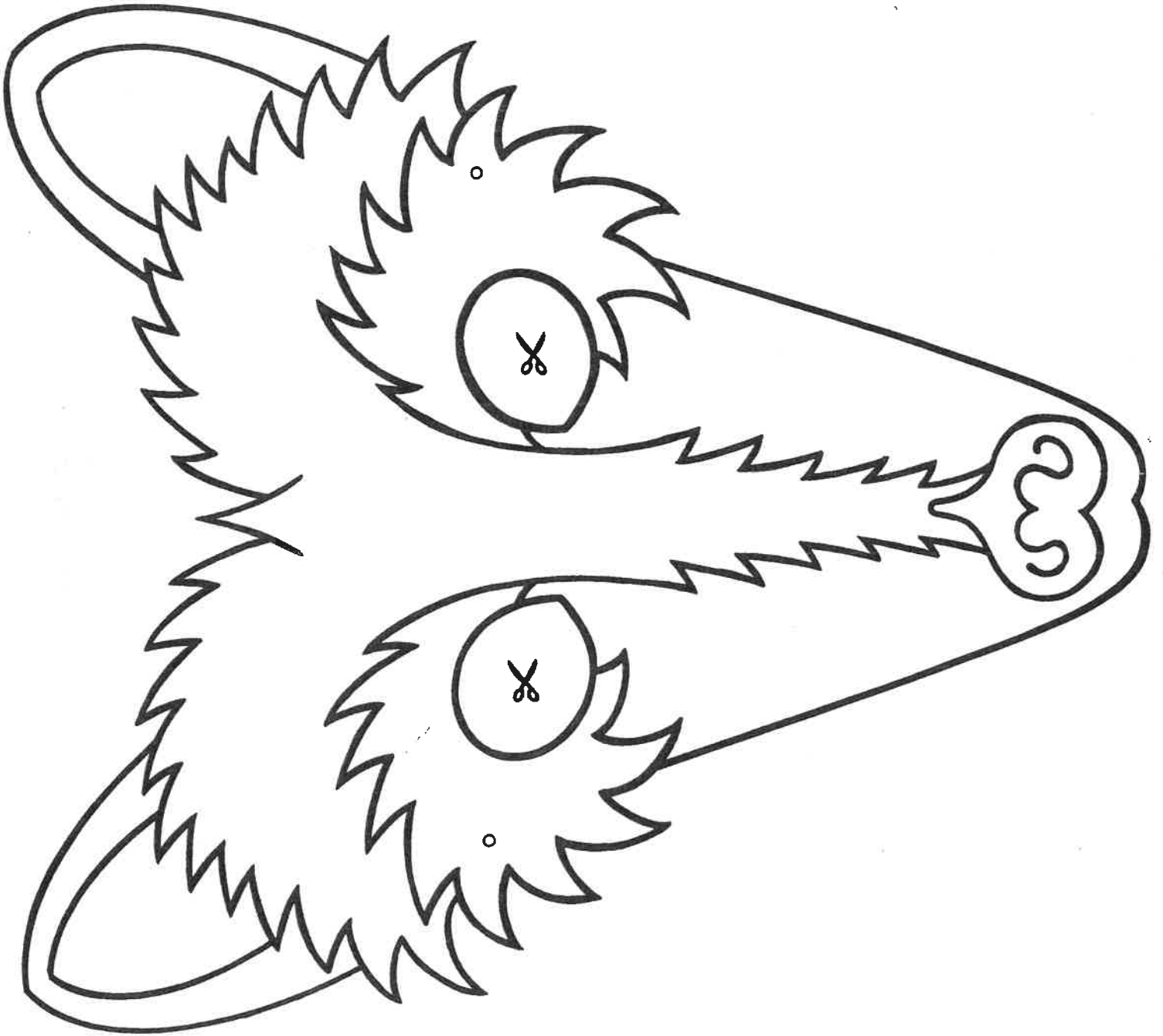
Fun Fact

Pteropus poliocephalus

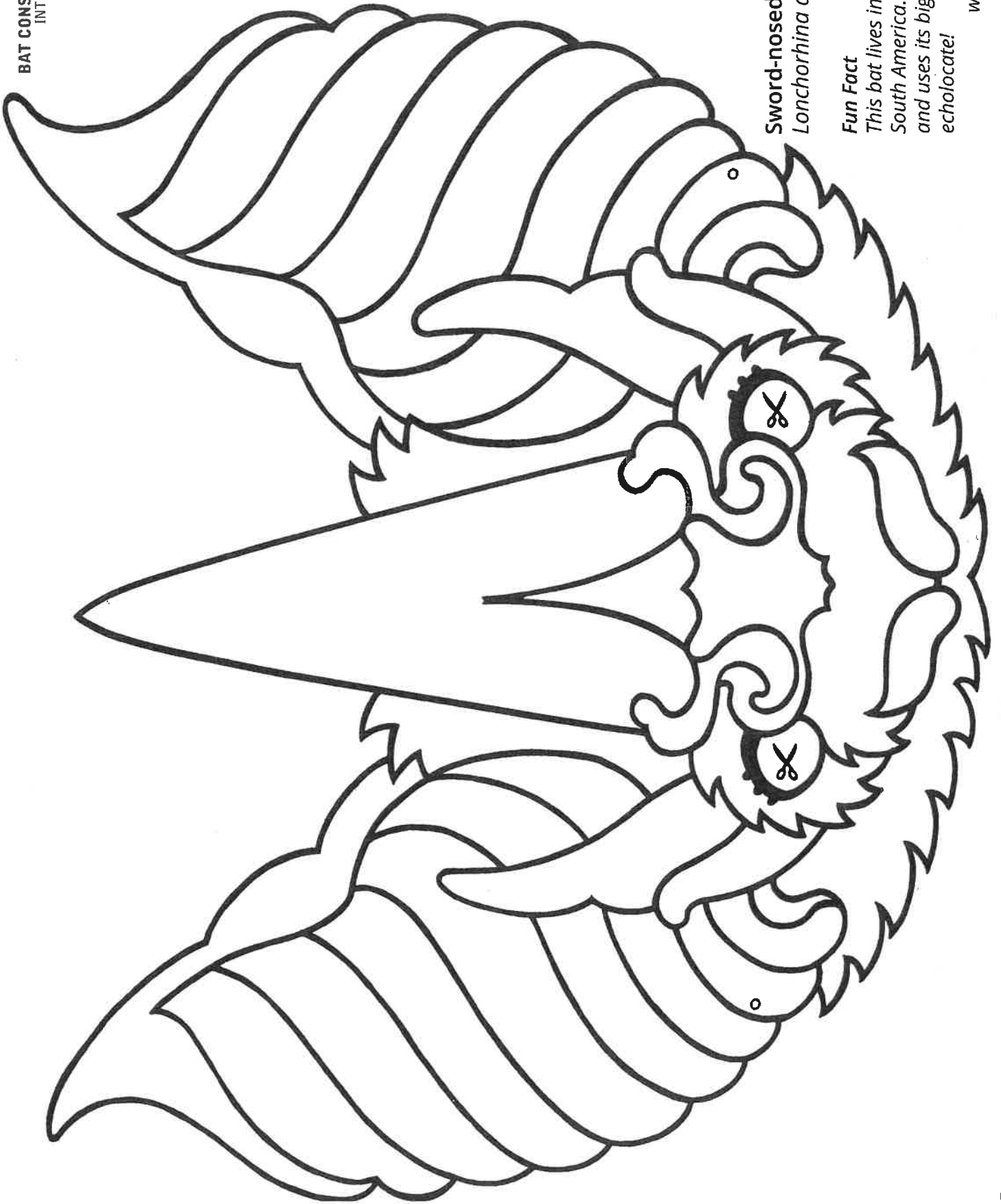
Fun Fact
