## Adult Fiction

**Chakraborty, Shannon.** *The Adventures of Amina al-Sirafi.* Bestselling author of *The City of Brass* spins a new trilogy of magic and mayhem on the high seas in this tale of pirates and sorcerers, forbidden artifacts and ancient mysteries, in one woman's determined quest to seize a final chance at glory—and write her own legend.

**Cussler, Clive**. The prolific author and adventurer created several captivating series and standalone novels. Cussler's novels often blend adventure, history, and intrigue, making them thrilling reads for fans of action-packed stories. His most notable series are Dirk Pitt, NUMA Files, Oregon Files. Set in Bombay during the early to late 1980s, the novel vividly portrays life in the bustling city. Roberts' semi-autobiographical tale weaves adventure, love, and redemption, making "Shantaram" a must-read for anyone seeking an immersive literary journey.

**Grann, David.** *The Wager: A tale of shipwreck, mutiny and murder.* From the author of *Killers of the Flower Moon*, a page-turning story of shipwreck, survival, and savagery, culminating in a court martial that reveals a shocking truth. Klinenberg, Eric. Palaces for the People: How social infrastructure can help fight inequality, polarization, and the decline of civic life. We are living in a time of deep divisions. Americans are sorting themselves along racial, religious, and cultural lines, leading to a level of polarization that the country hasn't seen since the Civil War. Pundits and politicians are calling for us to come together and find common purpose. But how, exactly, can this be done? Klinenberg believes that the future of democratic societies rests not simply on shared values but on shared spaces: the libraries, childcare centers, churches, and parks where crucial connections are formed. Richly reported and ultimately uplifting, Palaces for the People offers a blueprint for bridging our seemingly unbridgeable divides.

## Larson, Erik. Dead Wake: the last crossing of the Lusitania.

On May 1, 1915, with WWI entering its tenth month, a luxury ocean liner as richly appointed as an English country house sailed out of New York, bound for Liverpool, carrying a record number of children and infants. The passengers were surprisingly at ease, even though Germany had declared the seas around Britain to be a war zone. For months, German U-boats had brought terror to the North Atlantic. But the

Lusitania was one of the era's great transatlantic "Greyhounds"--the fastest liner then in service--and her captain, William Thomas Turner, placed tremendous faith in the gentlemanly strictures of warfare that for a century had kept civilian ships safe from attack.

**Wolfe, Tom.** *The Right Stuff.* This book explores the lives and experiences of the first Project Mercury astronauts selected for the NASA space program in the 1960s. The book delves into the personal and professional lives of these astronauts, highlighting their courage, competitiveness, and the immense pressure they faced. Tom Wolfe's captivating narrative captures the true heroism and courage of the first Americans to conquer space.
